#### **Consultative Meeting Report to support FLR, 20 September, 2002, Edinburgh, Scotland** *Building Assets for People and Nature: An Initiative to Catalyse and Reinforce Forest Landscape Restoration*

As a follow up to WSSD the UK Forestry Commission hosted a meeting in September to discuss a "Global Initiative on FLR". This initiative would bring together a number of partners (government, private sector and NGOs) to create a sort of "movement" on restoration and mobilise funds and attention towards "appropriate restoration".

## **ECONOMICS**

#### Paper on Forest Ecosystem Services

By Robert Nasi, Sven Wunder and José J. Campos

This paper shows that the main reasons for degradation of forest ecosystem services tend to be fundamental: deforestation most often happens because it pays for local people. The paper gives a brief overview of what are and what represent forest ecosystem services. It then considers the issues of price and valuation, and shows that valuation itself is not a solution but merely a tool. It concludes that if we (national, regional and global "off-site" beneficiaries) can increasingly "pay our way out" of the actual vicious circle, there will be more scope for optimism regarding the conservation of forests and their services to mankind throughout the world.

## Africa

## IUCN book launch "FLR: Building Assets for People and Nature - Experience from East Africa"

The publication **Forest Landscape Restoration: Building Assets for People and Nature -Experience from East Africa** was launched at the World Summit on Sustainable Development in August 2002. It describes the FLR approach, and provides three cases from East Africa - Tanzania, Kenya and Uganda. In East Africa, restoration is being used as a tool to promote both livelihood security and forest conservation. The three examples of projects from the region make it clear that the lessons from East Africa are pertinent to the rest of the world.

# IUCN and WWF East Africa Workshop Report & Four National reports & Regional Overview

A regional workshop was facilitated and organised by IUCN and WWF to address the consequences of forest loss in Eastern Africa in the context of Forest Landscape Restoration (FLR). The workshop was held in Mombasa in November 2001. Case studies from Tanzania, Uganda, Ethiopia, and Kenya were presented, followed by the presentation of a regional report. The presentation was based on findings of national FLR studies conducted earlier in the year.

# Cost Benefit Analysis of Alternative Land Use Options, Bulgarian Danube Islands Project

Final draft report, by Prof. Dr. A. Danchev – Fatih University Istanbul in cooperation with Green Balkans Federation and WWF DCPO, Sept 2002

The natural floodplain forests of the Bulgarian Danube Islands have been continuously converted into poplar monocultures. Fortunately, this extensive conversion was halted with the adoption of the Strategy for the Protection and Restoration of Floodplain Forests on the Bulgarian Danube Islands. The present Cost Benefit Analysis evaluates the economic importance, for a range of stakeholders, of selected land use options on the Danube islands, focusing in particular on the potential socio-economic benefits from the restoration and protection of healthy floodplain ecosystems.

#### The Southern Portugal Green Belt project report - WWF MedPO April 2002

The Southern Portugal Green Belt project is part of a larger Mediterranean ecoregion conservation initiative, called "Addressing the Root Causes of Desertification: The Green Belt Programme", which aims to set up effective networks of "functional conservation landscapes" where land planning can effectively integrate ecological and socio-economic requirements to secure the long-term conservation of habitats, species and ecological processes.
