This indicator influenced by the work carried out by the Violence and Damage Group. Some of the challenges highlighted by the group include:

- 1/ Lack of domestic abuse co-ordinator, which has led to difficulties in co-ordinating delivery to tackle this type of crime (30% of this violence definition is made up of Domestic Abuse). Also, it is likely that there has been increased reporting due to a range of initiatives that have raised awareness and confidence, for example Multi Agency Risk Assessment Conferences, meeting monthly, new Specialist Domestic Abuse Court in operation since January 2009, Independent Domestic Abuse Advisors working for the Island Women's Refuge and the Freedom programme for survivors of domestic abuse.
- 2/ A peak in low level violence was identified late afternoon early evening with the links to after-school bullying. The anti-bullying strategy has been delayed and not signed off until late on in the LPSA period and is not due to be launched in September 2009.
- 3/ A significant proportion of violent crime is alcohol-related.

Outturn for Jan-Mar 2008 cohort is used to calculate the baseline. Final data will be available only in July 2009.

Emerging baseline data for quarter 2 2008-09 from a cohort identified January, 2008 – March, 2008 shows that there are 22 in the cohort and their actual offending over six months was 20 whilst their predicted offending over six months is 36 (20/36 = 0.55). The suggested targets are an average 3% below baseline across 09/10 and 10-11 cohorts. This equates to 09/10 = 0.54 and 10/11 = 0.53. There is some concern that the OASys assessment may not give a true picture of the cohort as people who score four points on the assessment may not have an existing problematic drug misuse issue. The small numbers on the Island may lead to a misrepresentation of performance on the target.

Implementation of ICS has impacted significantly on practitioners being able to input assessments onto the system. This was not only a technical issue, but there are ongoing difficulties with staff capacity, because of the time it takes to input assessments. Additional support is being offered to staff for a six week period to attempt to address the backlog of work not previously input into Swift. Method of data collection is from ICS, therefore any assessments completed but not input are not counted. Courts do not accept ICS format, so hardcopy assessments have to be completed and input afterwards. Management scrutiny has been increased and an action plan following a GOSE audit is being implemented.

Isle of Wight performance was the worst performing of those Local Authorities (LA) who took part in the TellUs Survey. However, the sampling of the survey is questionable, in that 100% of our high schools took part, but in some LA <10% took part. The indicator uses two elements of Question 10 in the survey, and if we look at the results of % of young people self reporting being bullied in the last four weeks in school, or elsewhere, there is only 1% differential. This may indicate that we are improving, given that the response for whether young people had been bullied in the last 12 months shows a much larger difference. It may also indicate that we have less of a problem with systematic ongoing bullying, but that the incidents are random, individual incidents.

Whilst there is evidence of improvement in standards at GCSE, attainment remains below the national average. At Key Stage 2 there is declining attainment (at level 4) with significant concerns regarding cohort attainment 2008. The Local Authority have recently completed a two year school improvement project (with the DCSF) using Mouchel management and consultancy reporting to a monitoring board with DCSF, GOSE, National Strategies and Local Authority officers. There has been an extension of this project (two years) with significantly reduced funding and managed by the Local Authority and monitored through an improvement board. In addition the Local Authority is going through a programme of school reorganisation (3 tier to 2 tier) leading to the closure of all middle schools, the expansion of some primary schools and the re-opening (through competition) of secondary schools.
